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Message from the President



Dear Colleagues,

The year 2021 is still a difficult year for children. Although there are vaccines available for the COVID-19 pandemic which has changed the daily life of all children especially the educational activities, vaccines are not distributed equally and not all children (even not all adults) have access to the vaccines.

Sustainable Development Goals (SDG) are the focus of the International Pediatric Association (IPA) because it is related to children, it is related to child rights, and it is related to health. So, access of all children to COVID-19 vaccines I believe is related to the achievement of SDGs in the perspective of child, child rights and health.

However, we are already dealing with other universal problems which are among the SDGs and are defined as a child rights crisis leading to many health, environment and development related problems, such as the climate crisis.

UNICEF's Children's Climate Risk Index report has just been released. The report reveals that 1 billion children are at 'extremely high risk' of the impacts of climate change, and this is nearly half of all children. It has been reported that almost all children on earth are exposed to at least one climate and environmental hazard, heatwaves, cyclones, air pollution, flooding and water scarcity and approximately one-third of all children are exposed to four or more stresses. Children are more vulnerable and bear the greatest burden of climate change, as they are growing and developing and as they are the future.

Due to climate change we not only have extreme weather, toxic hazards and diseases but increasingly catastrophic droughts, fires and storms which also affects food and water systems. Although the 33 extremely high-risk countries emit just 9 % of global CO2 emissions, only one country ranked in the extremely high-risk index among the 10 highest emitting countries which are responsible for 70% of the emission. Children in least developed countries are under most risk.

As the injustice for the reach of COVID-19 vaccines, climate change effects create another injustice. IPA, working for "Every Child, Every Age, Everywhere" to leave no child behind, calls all pediatric societies, pediatricians and child health workers to advocate against injustice in their local, national and international platforms. Besides working for sustainable solutions against climate change again in our local, national and international platforms.

The planet and children need every possible step for brighter futures.

From Executive Director's Desk



Dear fellow colleagues,

Ever since the COVID-19 pandemic, IPA has been keeping up with the advancement of technologies to accommodate the demands of information sharing and continuing collaboration with our partners and member societies from seven regions all over the globe. Therefore, it is a tremendous pleasure for me as the IPA Executive Director 2021-2023 to demonstrate our commitment to publish the IPA Newsletter three times a year by presenting the IPA Newsletter Volume 15, Issue 3, 2021, the third newsletter of the year 2021.

Being an official partner of the World Health Organization (WHO), IPA actively participates in events convened by WHO, gives recommendations, and consultations on their drafts in diverse health issues to voice children's health. In September 2021, IPA was honoured to present three live statements at the 74th Session of the WHO Regional Committee for South-East Asia. IPA further was given opportunities to write statements for the 68th Session of The WHO Regional Committee for Eastern Mediterranean and the 72nd Session of The WHO Regional Committee for Western Pacific in the following

month. At the later event, a recommendation on safe school reopening in the context of the COVID-19 pandemic was submitted by IPA. Several surveys also had been arranged by the IPA Administrative/Executive Director Office to IPA member societies in advance to collect data from certain regions. IPA representatives hence could create high-quality statements that accurately address children's health issues in each region under the umbrella of IPA.

In September, consultative invitations from WHO Global Coordination Mechanism for the Prevention and Control of NCDs (GCM/NCD) on the Work Plan 2022-2025 and from WHO on the Ongoing Intersessional Work on NCDs and Mental Health were promptly responded by IPA. As a pediatric endocrinologist who currently serves as the Governing Council of NCD Child and has extensive experience in this field, it is an honour for me to submit recommendations on NCDs, representing IPA to advocate for "Every Child, Every Age, Everywhere".

All of IPA activities above, including member societies events, are regularly posted in IPA Social Media. The number of followers on IPA social media platforms has been steadily increasing from June to September 2021: from 1,427 to 1,696 on Instagram, from 3,872 to 4,271 on Twitter, and from 11,848 to 12,432 followers on Facebook. Official YouTube Channel of IPA also has seen an increase of 2,000 subscribers in the last 2 months. Given our profound influence across the globe, IPA welcomes member societies, partners, and other international organizations to collaborate and reach out to the unreached through the use of digital information and technology.

As we approach the end of 2021..

Welcome to this last issue of our newsletter for 2021. Other than the usual reports from member societies and IPA activities, we decided to invite our Assistant Editor, Dr Abdulsalam Abu Libdeh who is a Palestinian to write about what is happening on the ground and how they are coping. It is time for us to reflect on what is happening in the world around us and try and sort out what the politicians have done to mess it up. As a reputable international organisation representing paediatricians and speaking for children's rights, IPA should speak with a clear conscience on any transgression of children's rights and dignity, everywhere and anywhere.

What we have learnt from COVID-19

Two years of this pandemic have shown us new ways of communicating, developed new technologies and evolved new business models and work processes that would have taken decades to be realized. Online learning, although not ideal for children's development, has become a norm in most countries. As with the survivors of the Spanish flu of 1918, our children may have some psychological repercussions decades down the line that will be studied and documented by psychologists and psychiatrists of the future.

Alternative workplace or work from home (WFH) is another phenomenon that has a bearing on children's development. While many see this as a positive thing since both parents are at home, there are drawbacks too.

When both parents are busy on their computers, children are quite often left on their own with their own screen viewing. Exposure to television, smartphones and tablets are increasing among children(1). Paediatricians will discover this if they bother to enquire from parents.

The wearing of masks has had its fair share of controversy from the beginning. While many protest and shun it, there are others who have made fashion statements and innovations from this new norm. It has opened up a new area of business opportunities, and children's face masks are getting as fashionable with pictures of unicorns, fairies, princesses and superheroes.

In the beginning when the gold standard was the tight-fitting, industry-standard suffocating N95 mask, other standards like China's KN95(2) and Korea's KF94(3) have emerged as fashionable and comfortable alternatives. These adaptations are necessary as we step into a new world where masks will become a necessity when in confined public spaces, at least until we get the all-clear to unmask.

Children's vaccination next

We are now starting to give children COVID-19 vaccines with Pfizer-BioNTech getting the approval to vaccinate 12-yearolds and above. The initial fear of myopericarditis documented in 67 per million doses among male adolescents has changed to acceptance when subsequent data showed these were mild and resulted in complete recovery(4). Although news of China's Sinovac and SinoPharm vaccines have been trialed in children as young as 3 years old, the publication is still forthcoming.

We are starting to see children who have received their vaccination, especially the second dose, coming with chest pain and palpitations. Invariably, there is a history of play, exertion, excessive onscreen games (till early morning) following the vaccination. Lest we forget, we have to advise children

and adolescents to take complete rest for at least two weeks following their covid vaccination to minimize this risk. This includes online and onscreen games that cause sleep deprivation, which is a stress in itself.

As usual, we hope you enjoy reading this issue of the IPA newsletter. We appreciate any feedback so that we can improve. We wish everyone Merry Christmas and a Happy New Year 2022. Stay safe always and keep your distance.

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Plight of Children in East Jerusalem

Structural violence & aggression during a global pandemic

The aggression and violence that has happened during a global pandemic in occupied East Jerusalem in April-May 2021 following on the eviction of Palestinians in East Jerusalem including Sheikh Jarrah Neighborhood will affect Palestinians children's health and well-being either acutely or in the future.

Eviction and violence removed Palestinian children from a safe environment, resulting in toxic stress, which can have a lasting effect on health across their lives.

The conflict would inflict both health and psychological trauma to the children as well as their families in the presence of a global pandemic of COVID-19, including the restrictions of the pandemic itself.

Effects on Children and the Health System

These recent events have brought anger and frustration, as armed conflicts have both direct effects on children's physical health and indirect harms through chronic fear, toxic stress and deprivation.

As a result, Palestinian children will bear a significant burden due to this conflict, including physical, mental, developmental and behavioral health (increased prevalence of posttraumatic stress disorder, anxiety, behavioral and psychosomatic complaints)

which will persist long after the cessation of violence.

Service delivery planning, health-care quality and patient safety are highly needed to promote improved health outcomes, to protect the right to health, to reduce access barriers to health services, and to improve the social determinants of health for all Palestinians in the occupied Palestinian territory, including east Jerusalem.

Paediatricians' role

As pediatricians we are committed to the health and well-being of children everywhere, to ensure their rights, to safeguard children's health and well-being for a bright future for all, without racial or ethnic privileges and hierarchies, where all people can live as equals.

We urge to avert children's detention and abuse within this conflict, strive for a fair, equal and dignified treatment of our children.

Therefore, structural and political violence will continue to impose a heavy price to be paid by children, until it is completely dismantled, to have rights of protection and keep them safe from harm.

IPA LEAD Graduation Week 2021: Child Health Emerging Leaders Program

he IPA LEAD: Child Health Emerging Leaders Program is a mentored leadership development program designed for early career pediatricians over a 2.5-year curriculum. With the aim to build leadership capacity among emerging leaders in child health from around the world, the IPA LEAD program stands for "Leadership", "Engagement". "Advocacy" and "Determination". Over the duration of the program, the IPA LEADers have attended several workshops, in-person training and webinars that aim to equip them with the knowledge and skills required to drive improvements in child health.



Dr. Linda Arnold, the Coordinator of the IPA LEAD Program, explained in her address, "The idea behind the program is that pediatricians are uniquely prepared to talk about and understand the needs of children but we often do not receive leadership training. Therefore, IPA LEAD was designed to provide early career pediatricians and pediatric societies with the knowledge, skills and personal mentorship they would need to have a

greater influence on child health priorities. We are much stronger together than we are individually. The greater our numbers, the greater capacity we will have to advocate and lead improvements in child health."

As part of the curriculum, the 14 IPA LEADers participating in the program were given the opportunity to work on individual projects related to child health. To celebrate the accomplishments of the IPA LEADers and officially bring the program to an end, a series of virtual ceremonies and events were conducted over the course of three days in the IPA LEAD Graduation Week from 10-12 August 2021.





IPA at the Consultation on the WHO Hub for Pandemic and Epidemic Intelligence

n 10th August 2021, IPA Executive Director, Dr. Aman Pulungan, represented IPA to attend the virtual consultation on the WHO Hub for Pandemic and Epidemic Intelligence - Better Data. Better Analytics. Better Decisions (WHO Hub). The WHO Hub will be established as a new global platform for pandemic and epidemic intelligence,





creating shared and networked access to multi-sectoral data, surveillance and analytics innovation needed for all countries and partners to predict, prevent, detect, prepare for and respond to worldwide health threats. Oliver Morgan, the Director of the Health Emergency Information and Risk Assessment Department in the WHO Geneva's Health Emergency Program who has been leading on the technical development of the hub, presented the concept of the WHO Hub,

followed by discussions among participants. Dr. Pulungan raised an issue whether there would be any special program for pediatrics. Oliver Morgan explained that there was a gap of information both in younger age groups and the older age groups that they had experienced hence it could be very difficult to get information about different groups within the population during outbreaks and other infectious diseases events. He added that it was important to fill the gap



and the WHO Hub allowed them to do it. The lively discussion moved forward with active participation from all attendees. It ended with the announcement that WHO will be proceeding with a more definitive planning on the work of the hub in the last quarter of this year.

September 2021

WHO World Patient Safety Day 2021 Global Conference: "Together for safe and respectful maternal and newborn care"

Sometimes the leading voice for child health globally, IPA was invited to participate in the Global Conference organized by the WHO Patient Safety Flagship, entitled, "Together for safe and respectful maternal and newborn care", a virtual event conducted via Zoom from 14:00-18:00 CEST on 17 September 2021. The conference featured keynote addresses by global patient safety leaders and advocates, introduced global landscapes and stories from the ground on maternal and newborn health and safety, presented panel discussions on prioritizing safety in maternal and newborn care in the journey towards universal health coverage and the role of partners and introduced World Patient Safety Day Goals 2021.






As one of the panelists, Dr. Naveen Thacker (IPA President-Elect) shares IPA's positions, ongoing programs and plans of action with regards to the theme of maternal and newborn care, emphasizing the essential need to connect and integrate all newborn and child services with newborn care, whether for immunization, tobacco smoke, and other environmental exposures or mental health.

Dr. Naveen Thacker urged, "Now is the time that newborns should get their due place

in the healthcare system and the respect they deserve. In many parts of the world, a newborn is not counted as an independent person unless they are sick and get admitted into a newborn unit. As a result, important vital data related to newborn care are often not captured and monitored, which may result in inadequate planning and delay in care. Let us ensure the efforts and commitment to make every newborn count and get the safe and respectful care they deserve".

IPA Participation at WHO Global Coordination Mechanism of the Prevention and Control of NCDs Workplan 2022-2025 Virtual Consultation

n 23 September 2021, IPA participated in the WHO Global Coordination Mechanism of the Prevention and Control of NCDs (GCM/NCD) Virtual Consultation on the Workplan 2022-2025, providing comments on the work plan to be submitted by WHO GCM/NCD to the 75th World Health Assembly. With millions of children and adolescents globally impacted by NCDs, it is crucial that their voices be included in the global agenda for NCDs. Represented by Prof. Aman Pulungan as the IPA Executive Director, IPA urges the WHO GCM/NCD to include children and adolescents in the global NCD agenda, emphasizing the importance of access to medicine, newborn screening, prioritizing NCD targets and including the voices of children and young people living with NCDs.



"If we want to decrease one-third of the mortality caused by NCDs by the end of 2030, we have to start right now especially in our children as they will be adolescents and adults by then. A lot of member states do not really think NCDs in children is a problem yet. We urge the WHO to declare that all

countries should start preventing NCDs in children, urging all countries to start newborn screening and guarantee access to medicine. We have to start with children. Otherwise, we are going to have a lost generation", urged Prof. Aman Pulungan at the forum.

Global Webinar: Enabling Children to Grow Up in a Smoke-Free World: Policies and Practices

n 28 September 2021, the International Pediatric Association collaborated with the World Health Organization and ECD Action Network to conduct the Global Webinar: "Enabling children to grow up in a smoke-free world: policies and practices". The webinar probed further into the Thematic Brief Tobacco control for children's health and development and provides examples of how comprehensive smoke-free policies positively impact child health and development.

Prof. Aman Pulungan (IPA Executive Director) was honored to present "Balancing the interests of tobacco companies with governments' goals for tobacco control in Indonesia". In his address, he urged "We need to work together. WHO, governments, and stakeholders should support the tobacco control issues. IPA has to encourage all the members to share their experience on the matter and remind others where it is needed."

Representing IPA in Partners' Reflection Session, Dr. Jonathan Klein (IPA Treasurer) leaves the message, "The partnership between governments along with that advocacy from professional voices can help address the integration of these issues. The role of IPA and the other global professional organizations is to help bring those partners together. With WHO, UNICEF, and other partners here I hope we will continue to be able to ensure that every child can grow up in a smoke-free environment, end the epidemic of nicotine addiction, and have a true smoke-free generation."

IPA Statements at the 74th Session of the WHO Regional Committee for South-East Asia

s a leading voice for child health globally, IPA represents the voice of every child, every age, everywhere at the 74th Session of the WHO Regional Committee for South-East Asia on 6 to 10 September 2021.

On behalf of IPA, Prof. Aman Pulungan (IPA Executive Director) and Dr. Naveen Thacker (IPA President-Elect) voiced concerns, positions and recommendations from IPA to all delegates present. Below is the summary of IPA's statements delivered on specific agendas of the 74th WHO Regional Committee for South-East Asia.

Agenda 8.1: Accelerating progress on prevention and control of NCDs, including oral health and integrated eye care, in the WHO South-East Asia Region

NCD in children needs to be a priority. IPA applauds the WHO's Global Action Plan for the Prevention and Control of Noncommunicable Diseases 2013–2020, and the Global Coordination Mechanism on the Prevention and Control of Noncommunicable Diseases (GCM/NCD). However, continued integration, focus and inclusion of child and adolescent health into the NCD agenda is essential. Action needed to address inequities in the prevention and control of childhood NCDs require time and commitment from a broad range of stakeholders. IPA urges WHO to initiate and implement programs that tackle the hard-hitting issues on the rights

and needs of children and young people who are living with NCDs, particularly in the South-East Asia Region where these types of programs are barely available.

Agenda 8.3: Strategic Framework of the South-East Asia Regional Vaccine Action Plan 2022–2030 as aligned with the Global Immunization Agenda 2030

IPA fully supports the Immunization Agenda 2030 and is committed towards playing an active role in supporting Strategic Priority 2 - Commitment and Demand of Immunization Agenda 2030 and thereby contributing to Immunization Agenda 2030. As we have invested a lot in developing and making available COVID-19 vaccines, now it is time to invest equally in developing a robust communication strategy for strengthening trust in immunization systems and ensuring services are appropriate, understood, and accepted by communities making them more likely to be used sustainably.

Agenda 9.1: Measles and rubella elimination by 2023

IPA applauds WHO's commitments particularly member states of the Southeast Asia region who have adopted the goal of "measles and rubella elimination by 2023"

and endorsed the strategic plan for the period of 2020-2024. With the ongoing battle against COVID-19, global childhood vaccination through routine immunization services have declined in a majority of countries as part of the many essential service disruptions occurring due to the pandemic. WHO and member states are urged to drive catch-up immunization in their respective countries to protect children from preventable illnesses, including measles and rubella by firmly embedding measles and rubella programs as a national priority, rectifying gaps in immunization coverage, and tailoring existing immunity gaps to local challenges, conditions and available resources. hroughout the period of the devastating pandemic, global BPA Executive Committee along with the general members have collaborated tirelessly, not only to participate in the treatment of children affected by COVID-19 in Bangladesh, but also in assisting the Government of Bangladesh in devising the national COVID-19 policy, real-time paediatric case statistics gathering from all over the country as well as having numerous seminars. conferences meetings amongst the members of BPA (both online and offline) to aid and assist in conducting the core responsibilities and activities of the organization in the field of child health in Bangladesh. Furthermore, BPA has paid a round-the-clock active role in monitoring the paediatric COVID-19 situation in the country and has constantly worked behind the scenes, in collaboration with the Directorate General of Health Services (DGHS) Bangladesh, to devise effective case

management and treatment planning for the children affected by the virus. BPA has also been able to collect and compile the statistics of paediatric COVID-19 cases from all over the country, which plays a pivotal role in successful case management of children affected with COVID-19.

A summary of selected activities conducted by BPA are listed below:

- Research Grant Distribution Program on 7 January 2021
 This year, the research grant was awarded to 18 talented young researchers from different institutes from all over the country.
- Training Program with Research, Training and Management (RTM) International On 28 February 2021- 11 March 2021, BPA provided technical assistance to RTM International in facilitating/moderating five workshops in Bangladesh on five workshops in various parts of Bangladesh.
