## **IPA Congress 2025**

IPA Congress 2025: An Interview with Dr Carlos Alonso-Rivera

#### 1. What are you looking forward to most about hosting the IPA Congress in Mexico in 2025?

Mexican pediatricians are looking forward to the opportunity to receive colleagues from different countries and to be able to exchange experiences in relation to child and adolescent health. It will be an honor to bring together leading experts from all regions of the world in a single event, with the sole purpose of learning and updating knowledge to provide better care to our patients. On the other hand, as a Latin American region we want to show the world our experience, our challenges and our opportunities in paediatric care.

#### 2. What do you think are some of the highlights of the congress program?

The scientific program of the congress has been carefully designed by the organizers and the scientific committee that includes the 2 host Mexican pediatric societies in collaboration with the president of IPA, Dr. Naveen Thacker. During the 3 days of the congress, current knowledge in different pediatric specialties such as infectious diseases, gastroenterology, neurology, neonatology, critical medicine, adolescent medicine, among others, will be discussed, and we will also have the participation of different international agencies who will talk about the challenges of child health in our times, access to vaccines, breastfeeding, etc. We believe that it is a very complete program and rich in up-to-date knowledge.

#### 3. For first time visitors to Mexico what do you think will surprise them the most during their time there?

In addition to the excellent scientific program that we have prepared for all those attending the congress, we have also thought of all those who visit our country for the first time, so different social and tourist activities have been organized in parallel to the scientific activities. We will make available to our visitors different agencies that will help us to have a rich cultural experience that our country offers to visitors. Mexico awaits them with open arms.

#### 4. What are the essential foods we must try when there?

Mexico has a rich gastronomic offer for our visitors, but without a doubt we cannot miss tasting the popular food of our region. Tacos, quesadillas, mole, tamales. Of course, we must not forget tequila and mezcal as the most well-known drinks in our region. We have food and drink for all tastes. We just need to be careful with foods seasoned with chili (spicy), because they can be a surprise!

## 5. For those people who have some extra time before or after the Congress is there a local attraction they must not miss?

Mexico City is one of the largest cities in the world and offers a wide variety of tourist attractions. A visit to the pyramids of Teotihuacan, the different churches such as the metropolitan cathedral and the basilica of Guadalupe should not be missed. In addition, you can visit the canals of Xochimilco with its traditional "Chinampas". In the cultural part it is important to visit the different museums in the city, probably one of the best recommendations is the National Museum of Anthropology and History, where you can find impressive pieces from the pre-Hispanic period. For those who have additional time, before or after the congress, there are numerous beach destinations or colonial cities, and "magical towns" that can be visited by domestic flights 1-2 hours away from Mexico City.

## IPA Executive Committee (EC) and Standing Committee (SC) Physical Meeting in Casablanca, Morocco







On 9 August 2024, IPA Executive had their annual physical meeting at Hyatt Regency Hotel in Casablanca, Morocco. Eight of the nine Executive members joined in person, while Dr. Enver Hasanoglu (Immediate President) was not able to be present. The meeting, chaired by Dr. Naveen Thacker (current IPA President) started at 8.30 AM Morocco Time. The IPA Executive Committee (EC) 2023-2025, namely Dr. Naveen Thacker (President), Dr. Joseph Haddad (President-Elect), Dr. Aman Pulungan (Executive Director), Dr. Jonathan Klein (Treasurer), Dr. Adamos Hadjipanayis (Coordinator of Development), Dr. Carlos G Alonso Rivera, Dr. Amy Gray, and Dr. Ana Beatriz Rosas-Sumano (IPA Congress 2025 Co-President), primarily discussed the upcoming IPA Congress 2025 in Mexico and the IPA Election 2025-2027. The meeting concluded at 9:30 AM Morocco Time.

The IPA SC Meeting convened at the hotel following the Executive meeting. A total of 27 of 31 SC members attended, 26 in person and one person virtually. The meeting commenced at 10.00 AM Morocco Time. The IPA Officers, namely Dr. Naveen Thacker (President), Dr. Joseph Haddad (President-Elect), Dr. Aman Pulungan (Executive Director), Dr. Jonathan Klein (Treasurer), and Dr. Adamos Hadjipanayis (Coordinator of Development), presented their report to the SC and had a robust discussion on IPA plans for the current term. IPA SC 2023-2025 was divided into several rooms for concurrent breakout sessions for IPA SC Subcommittees. The four IPA SC Subcommittees discussed their group's ongoing activities and upcoming targets/plans, which they then reported to all the SC members. Dr. Thacker then summarized the action plans and concluded the meeting with the SC's agreement.

The second day of the IPA SC Meeting convened on August 10, 2024, at 8:00 AM Morocco Time. The meeting was structured with six distinct sessions, each focusing on a specific agenda item. Dr. Joseph Haddad initiated the proceedings with a discussion on the IPA's strategic planning for the 2025-2027 term. Subsequently, Dr. Rosas and Dr. Rivera led a comprehensive discussion about the upcoming IPA Congress 2025 in Mexico. Dr. Thacker then chaired a robust deliberation on the IPA Election 2025-2027 and the IPA Program Areas and Working Groups. Following these discussions, representatives from various IPA regional and subspecialty member societies presented their activities and programs. Dr. Thacker then concluded the meeting with a summary of the discussions and agreements reached by the SC members, officially adjourning the proceedings.

Dr. Naveen Thacker participated in the 15th WHO South-East Asia Regional Immunization Technical Advisory Group (SEAR-ITAG) meeting, which was held on 20-23 August 2024 in New Delhi, India. Representing the IPA, Dr. Thacker took part in the effort to provide evidence-based recommendations aimed to enhance immunization strategies in the region.

## Virtual Side Event: Science Summit at the 79th UN General Assembly



On 11 September 2024, Dr. Naveen Thacker and Professor Aman Pulungan participated as key speakers in the Virtual side event: Science Summit at the 79th UN General Assembly. In his presentation titled "NBS Success Story from Indonesia," Prof. Pulungan highlighted the various challenges and strategies involved in implementing Newborn Screening in Indonesia. Meanwhile, Dr. Thacker delivered a presentation on the role of the IPA in global pediatric care, extending an invitation to the audience to attend the IPA Congress 2025 in Mexico with his presentation titled "The Role of Pediatricians in Driving Change: An Invitation to IPA Congress 2025."

#### **Pediatric Association Advocacy for Immunization Priorities**



Since 2023, the IPA has been strengthening immunization efforts in collaboration with the Indonesian Pediatric Society and Pediatric Association of Nigeria. Through national training of various professions in both countries, this initiative has built a network of resource persons to combat misinformation, support immunization programs for HPV vaccine and to strengthen immunization programs overall. The project is progressing steadily, now reaching regional levels. Building on the initial success of national workshops, regional chapters are actively engaging healthcare professionals, community leaders, and policymakers to amplify HPV vaccine efforts.



#### **UNAPSA**

The Union of African Paediatrics Societies and Association (UNAPSA) held its Congress along with the Botswana Paediatric Association (BPA) from August 6th-9th in Gaborone, Botswana. The ceremony was declared open by the Minister of Health from Botswana, Dr Edwin Dikoloti. Scientific sections were held covering various areas of the care of the child . The theme for the congress was; "Global and Local Perspective on Holistic Paediatric and Neonatal care."

New Executive members of UNAPSA were elected at the end of the UNAPSA/BPA congress. The current President is Dr Gody Jean Chysostome from the Central African Republic Paediatric Society.

Dr John Appiah from Ghana Paediatric Association was unanimously supported as President elect while Dr Bridget Okoeguale, Executive Director of UNAPSA was unanimous re-elected for a second tenure of five years.

# North America REGION

#### **AAP**

The American Academy of Pediatrics (AAP) would like to highlight key activities of our global work over the past few months.

From August 10-11, the AAP hosted its second Global POCUS workshop and Global Health Education Course (GHEC) at its headquarters. GHEC had 34 attendees while the POCUS course had 28 learners. Expert faculty from the US and East Africa led the annual course, which received high ratings and great feedback. Participants learned about topics from dealing with disasters and managing children in conflict settings to

emerging and re-emerging diseases. Those that joined in person participated in a global health procedural skills workshop where they learned how to perform a few simple procedures using equipment available in low-resource settings. They also heard from an expert panel on global health careers.

The American Foundation for Suicide Prevention (AFSP) awarded AAP a Blue Sky Research Grant for a new 3-year research study on adolescent mental health in Ethiopia. In close collaboration with the Ethiopian Pediatric Society, Nationwide Children's Hospital, and Northwestern University, AAP will assess the feasibility and acceptability of a new

culturally adapted combined suicide screening and safety planning package for Ethiopian youth across four regional hospitals. This project will present an opportunity to conduct cutting-edge intervention and implementation science research to adapt existing evidence-based practices and referral pathways for the Ethiopian context.





In addition to the AFSP new grant, the AAP was awarded a new 3-year grant from the Hilton Foundation to continue our early childhood development (ECD) work in East and Southern Africa collaborating with pediatric associations in Kenya, Mozambique and Tanzania. In addition Merck awarded AAP a new grant to adapt our vaccine hesitancy simulation curriculum in Eastern Europe alongside the Albanian Pediatric Society.

Essential Newborn Care (ENC) trainings were held in Mexico and Rwanda. In Mexico, Dr Carlos Ramos supported expansion of a network of trainers in ENC in Tabasco. In Rwanda, in collaboration with Laerdal Global Health and the World Health Organization (WHO), an ENC 1 workshop was held at the International Confederation of Midwives (ICM) regional conference on Sept 26.

An AAP-supported pre-service early child development (ECD) course of the East Central and Southern Africa College of Pediatrics and Child Health (ECSAPACH) was completed by 82 participants from Kenya, Zimbabwe, Uganda, Tanzania, Ethiopia, and Botswana. ECSAPACH is currently in the process of engaging the remaining participants to gather their feedback and contributions to gain more insights from participants. Overall, feedback was extremely positive (95.8% highly satisfied or satisfied) and learners scored high on post-lecture quizzes (average score for all three lectures 90% or greater) translating to effective course delivery and content.

In June 2024, AAP visited Suriname to facilitate pediatric society capacity building workshops with Vereniging Kinderartsen Suriname (VKS - Association of Pediatricians in Suriname). The 3-day workshops were held with 12 of the 16 pediatricians in Suriname and used human-centered design principles to develop VKS's first mission statement, to identify professional association priorities, and

The 7th Asia Dengue Summit (ADS) 2024, June 5-7, 2024. "Towards Zero Dengue Deaths: Innovation, Collaboration, Action in Asia."

With over 390 million infections annually, dengue remains one of the most widespread and fastest-growing vector-borne diseases globally. To

address the growing threat of dengue, over 500 leading dengue experts from 20 countries including clinicians, academia, researchers, public health leaders and policymakers gathered at the 7th Asia Dengue Summit 2024 that was held at the Double Tree Hilton Kuala Lumpur, Malaysia from June 5-7, 2024.

**The Topic Highlights** included: Epidemiology of Dengue, Dengue Human Infection Models, Aedes Mosquito Interactions, Pathogenesis and Immunity in Dengue Virus Infection and Dengue Vaccines.

The 7th ADS was officiated by the Malaysian Deputy Minister of Health, Lukanisman Awang Sauni. The Summit was a success!

The three-day summit opened with a speech by Prof. Dr. Zulkifli Ismail, Chairman of the Asia Dengue Voice and Action (ADVA) 33rd Meeting of the Technical Advisory Group on Immunization and Vaccine-preventable Diseases in the Western Pacific region, June 18-21, 2024, Manila, Philippines/Hybrid

Prof. Emeritus Dr. Lulu Bravo from the Philippines represented the Asia Pacific Pediatric Association (APPA) during the 4-day meeting. **The objectives of the meeting were:** 

- To understand progress and identify challenges in implementing the strategies and achieving the goals of the Regional Strategic Framework for Vaccine-preventable Diseases and Immunization in the Western Pacific 2021-2030
- To determine a way forward in strengthening routine immunization systems, leveraging good practices and lessons identified from Covid-19 vaccination to reach the unreached through targeted routine immunization, protecting more people along the life course and through the introduction of new vaccines.

pediatric care worldwide.



Continuing with the celebrations and recognising World Breastfeeding Week, the Breastfeeding Committee held the International Breastfeeding Forum 2024 where hundreds of Spanish-speaking pediatricians enjoyed topics such as the "Role of the pediatrician in the delivery room", "Tips to support breastfeeding in a postpartum state", "Tearing down the myths about breastfeeding" and "Perfect latching: problems and solutions".

In its work with IPA, ALAPE's President Dr. Marcela Fama and Past President Dr. Carlos Alonso, (both members of the Standing Committee) continue to represent the Latin American region and its interests including the following areas of work:

- 1. Increase, protect and promote breastfeeding through the commitment of the various pediatric associations around the world.
- 2. Promote vaccination using global strategies to raise awareness about the diseases that

- could be prevented by vaccination and use its impact as mechanism to be accepted.
- 3. Create a committee to reinforce the importance of the First 1000 days as strategy to start a healthy life from birth that contributes to prevent non-communicable diseases.
- 4. Include Pediatric Palliative Care, needed by many children in low- and middle-income countries.
- 5. Establish alliances with international organizations such as PAHO/WHO and Save the Children, among others, to advocate together for the rights of the children and adolescents.
- 6. CONAPEME's program "Doctor reader" contributes with plans and programs to encourage reading on children living in rural and urban zones, creating bridges in remote communities that facilitate installation of libraries with donated books to support children's learning in their community.









## **Latin America Region**

The Global Health Conference of the Americas was held from September 3rd – 5th, 2024 at the Graham Center Modesto A. Maidique Campus of the Florida International University. ## 3 Takeaways from Prof. Berthold Koletzko's Remarks

- 1. Investing in childhood brings huge societal benefits. Strong evidence shows that investing in health during the first 1,000 days, from preconception to early childhood, has lifelong advantages. It lowers the risk of non-communicable diseases like obesity, diabetes, and heart disease, while increasing productivity. We must act on this knowledge.
- 2. We need more well-trained professionals. There's a growing shortage of paediatricians, child psychiatrists, nurses, and other specialists across Europe. We must attract more young

people to these vital careers and create working conditions that retain them.

**3. Collaboration is key.** The European Academy of Paediatrics (EAP) is ready to support WHO's child and adolescent health agenda. By working together, we can ensure a healthier future for our children.

# International Subspecialty Pediatric Societies

#### **ISTP**

Since the term of the current ISTP president (and

member of the IPA Standing Committee), Prof. Rajeshwar Dayal, it has been a goal to have the presence of ISTP felt in scientific conferences,





particularly in Asia and other tropical countries. This initiative aims to raise awareness of the challenges faced by children in the tropics and provide updated recommendations and potential solutions for diseases such as TB, diarrhoea, malnutrition, and vector-borne diseases.

The following activities and achievements are noted:

- 7th Asia Dengue summit in Kuala Lumpur in June 2024. Organised by Dr. Zulkifli Ismail
- 2. Drs. R. Dayal, Mortada Elshabrawi, Iqbal Memon, Ashraf Sultan, Vasant Khalatkar, Mansoor Hussain and Nikhil delivered lectures at the South-East Asian Pediatric Association (SAPA) convention held in Colombo, Sri Lanka from June 9-11, 2024.
- 3. Prof. em. Usa Thisyakorn delivered a lecture at the conference of the International Society on Thrombosis and Haemostasis (ISTH) held at Bangkok, Thailand in June 2024
- 4. Dr. R. Dayal moderated an IPA webinar on Diagnosis of Paediatric Tuberculosis in July 2024 which was attended by over 500 participants globally
- 5. Dr. Mortada Elshabrawi, the former President of ISTP from 2020-2023, has been elected as a member of the International Election Committee of the IPA.
- 6. The ISTP in collaboration with Arab Union of Physicians has designed a curriculum for a course in "Paediatric Nutrition" directed by Professor Nehal El Koofy. The facilitators include Prof. Rajeshwar Dayal, Prof. Mortada Elshabrawi and Prof. em. Michael B. Krawinkel. It will be rolled out soon.

The ISTP has also been involved in the organization of the 18th Asia Pacific Conference on Pediatrics (APCP), to be held on November 14-17, 2024 in Cebu City, Philippines. Prof. Lulu Bravo, the Executive Director of the ISTP, together with Dr. Daniel Go has organized a vaccinology master course to discuss various principles related to vaccines and surveillance of vaccine-preventable diseases. Various symposia on Japanese Encephalitis (JE), dengue, and vaccine hesitancy are included in panel discussion, symposia and plenary topics.

#### **IAAH**

The International Association for Adolescent Health (IAAH), a specialty society member of IPA was founded in 1987 as a multidisciplinary global organization dedicated to improving the health, development and wellbeing of adolescents and young adults in every region of the world through evidence-based practices and policies (www. IAAH.org). IAAH is committed youth participation in leadership and to ensuring that young voices inform our work.

IAAH sponsors International Adolescent Health Week (IAHW), scheduled for October 7-13, 2024. Young people from more than 60 countries are serving as youth ambassadors, leading events in their countries, communities, and schools. This year's IAHW is the first held in partnership with WHO. IAHW 2024 also commemorates the 1-year anniversary of the PMNCH led Global Forum for Adolescents (GFA) and the Call to Action for Adolescent Health and Wellbeing. IAAH is working closely with IPA on IPA led 2023 GFA health care professional societies' commitment to improve adolescent health.

IAAH is also working with WHO on global consultation towards revisions of WHO's 2015 global adolescent health standards of care and core competencies guidelines; new publications



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and tools are due to be released in May 2025 at the World Health Assembly.

The <u>2025 IAAH World Congress</u> will be held November 6-8, 2025, in Montego Bay, Jamaica. The call for abstracts and workshops is now open for submissions for this meeting. A call for nominations for IAAH Regional Vice-Presidents and Council members, and for leadership positions in the IAAH Emerging Professionals Network will be launched in coming months.

2024 is an exciting year for IAAH and for global adolescent health. You can stay informed by signing up for the <u>IAAH newsletter</u>; or consider becoming a member of IAAH at <u>iaah.org/memberships</u> to help support or to get involved in IAAH activities.

#### **FISPGHAN**



The ESPGHAN Annual Congress in Milan, Italy, hosted a total of 5,602 participants, with 5,314 attending in person and 288 joining online. Free online access was

once more offered to delegates from Ukraine. Attendees represented 104 countries across various continents, emphasizing the meetings global reach. Continuing its tradition, the event was preceded by a full day of educational postgraduate courses in gastroenterology, hepatology, nutrition, and Inflammatory Bowel Disease (IBD), along with specialized programs for Allied Health Professionals (AHP) and Young ESPGHAN members.

Alongside the courses, all 20 ESPGHAN Working Groups held their meetings, some open to external attendees, demonstrating the organization's ongoing initiatives. In 2024, ESPGHAN invited six external societies to host joint sessions, expanding the congress' scope and promoting collaboration within the field of GHN. The new IUS Learning Zone debuted this year gaining instant popularity and prompting

continuation in 2025. The congress received a total of 1,675 abstract submissions, with 1,547 accepted for presentation, including oral and e-posters, during dedicated sessions and e-poster stations.



ESPGHAN's annual activities extend beyond the annual congress. The Working- and Special Interest Groups, producing evidence-based guidelines and position papers, continue to be among the society's most important components. Educational initiatives also remain a key focus with 14 educational events and a variety of webinars held throughout 2024. Approximately 2,200 individuals completed the first ESPGHAN MOOC (Massive Open Online Course) on Enteral Nutrition, with more MOOCs planned in the future.







In May, SIOP was represented by Dr. Rashmi Dalvi and Dr. Maja Beck at the 77th World Health Assembly (WHA). Dr. Dalvi delivered a powerful statement emphasising the necessity of integrating childhood cancer strategies within global health agendas highlighting the urgency of recognising this as a public health priority. Additionally, SIOP supported 8 other constituency statements ensuring visibility of childhood cancer, particularly under the framework of the WHO Global Initiative for Childhood Cancer (GICC) as well as in the broader NCD agenda as a "Best Buy" intervention for NCDs. SIOP also co-sponsored and participated in a side-event on Nutrition in Childhood NCDs at the WHA.

On World No Tobacco Day 2024, on 31 May, SIOP raised awareness about the dangers of tobacco use for children and childhood cancer survivors while advocating for stronger tobacco control measures globally. In July, SIOP partnered with Childhood Cancer International (CCI) to host a webinar focused on the unique needs and challenges faced by childhood cancer survivors. This session brought together experts and survivors to highlight the importance of comprehensive care that extends beyond treatment, ensuring that survivors receive the necessary support for their physical and emotional well-being.

From June to August, SIOP collaborated with CCI to analyse submissions from the International Childhood Cancer Day (ICCD) campaign to identify challenges and inequalities faced by individuals dealing with childhood cancer. The collected data was segmented by regions and demographic groups to better understand disparities and the barriers to care experienced in various contexts. We encourage you to follow our social media channels as we share the findings throughout Gold September.

Through these initiatives, SIOP reaffirms its commitment to advancing childhood cancer

The WOFAPS Newsletter from January to June 2024 celebrates the 50th anniversary of the World Federation of Associations of Pediatric Surgeons (WOFAPS), established in 1974. The newsletter highlights key organizational details, including the current office bearers and executive council members. It outlines the objectives of WOFAPS, which include promoting high standards in pediatric surgery, encouraging ethical practices, enhancing education and training, and supporting pediatric surgical research.

The inaugural World Pediatric Surgery Day was celebrated globally on April 7, 2024, with the theme "Who is a Pediatric Surgeon?" and "What is Pediatric Surgery?" The newsletter details the wide participation across various countries, marking the day with activities, public lectures, and media coverage to raise awareness about pediatric surgery.



WOFAPS continues to endorse conferences and workshops worldwide, focusing on pediatric surgical education and innovation. The newsletter lists recent endorsed events, such as the Live Exstrophy Bladder-Epispadias Workshop in Bangladesh and the 8th International Conference on Stem Cells and Cancer in New Delhi, India.





The newsletter also reports on the regular executive meetings and regional activities of WOFAPS, showcasing the organization's commitment to global pediatric surgical care. It outlines the organization's scholarships, mentoring opportunities, and plans for future congresses, including the 8th WOFAPS Congress scheduled for 2025 in Antalya, Turkey.
